September is National Attendance Awareness Month

Crenshaw County Schools is committed to working with you to ensure that your child has the opportunity to do well in school! The first step in your child doing well in school is making sure that they arrive to school each day and are on time. Children who attend school daily have a better chance of learning and succeeding in school and in life. Research supports that attendance is directly related to school outcomes. Those children who miss a large portion of the school year are less likely to meet many of the milestones used to determine school success. Students who are chronically absent in kindergarten and 1st grade are much less likely to read proficiently by 3rd grade. By 6th grade, chronic absence is the strongest predictor of course performance; and by 9th grade, it is the strongest predictor of graduation. Let's work together to promote regular, daily attendance!
